

The Distant Gaze Collection (2017)

Birthed after exploring a friend's private collection, "The Distant Gaze" is a collection of works initially inspired by images of Ethiopian and Eritrean women documented at the turn of the century by foreign photographers. It was quite evident that many of these images reflected the foreign gaze as it relates to the black female body; the same women could be depicted in varying levels of nudity as a still form of striptease. Many of these images became postcards for sale in the European market. Through these images, I found it impossible not to question the implications of the returned gaze of each sitter. The question of how these women's bodies were objectified and commodified started an exploration in my work into how to re-vision or re-visit these images. The collection is a reflection and a conversation on how women are portrayed, and also the various contemporary issues that still prevail regarding women in Africa and beyond our borders.

MEMORIES IN DEVELOPMENT -2017

"Memories in Development" is a collection inspired by the Cuban film Memories in Underdevelopment, written and directed by Tomas Guiterrez. The 1968 film is based on the story of a Cuban writer who chose to remain in Havana as his wife and friends fled to Miami. Through the eyes of the lead character, the story line explores the complex narrative of the impacts of social changes that took place in Cuba through the revolution. I saw this film in film school and it stayed with me for a long time. Eventually, I decided to build a collection based on the relationship between political structures and the developing societies in Africa. In a sense, for many of us in Africa, we are often the victims of poor leadership, which has played a major role in our self-determination for a better life. The collection is an exploration on the impacts of politics in not only the larger scope of our societies, but how it also has a major influence in our personal lives.





Born in Addis Ababa in 1974, Muluneh graduated from Howard University in Washington D.C with a degree in Film. Currently, her work is on exhibition in the Tate Modern. Her photography has also been published widely and can be found in the permanent collections of the Museum of Modern Art (MoMA), the Smithsonian's National Museum of African Art, the Hood Museum, The RISD Museum of Art, and the Museum of Biblical Art in the United States.

She was the 2007 recipient of the European Union Prize in the Rencontres Africaines de la Photographie in Bamako, Mali; the 2010 winner of the CRAF International Award of Photography in Spilimbergo, Italy; and the 2018 CatchLight Fellow in San Francisco, USA. In 2019, she became the first black woman to co-curate the Nobel Peace Prize exhibition and in the following year, she returned as a commissioned artist for the prize.

These following prints will be auctioned at our 2023 Make Equality Reality Gala. A portion of the proceeds will benefit Equality Now, and the remainder will go to the artist. Aida Muluneh's work typically sells for \$20,000 - \$40,000 in NYC galleries.

This work is about political optimism, with the female models representing the role of women in politics and society. Part of my optimism comes from celebrating African cultures and traditions, but also about the need for the female voice. "The Bridge Between" captures Ethiopia's political history. The chair painted with different symbols charts the country's transition from an empire before the monarchy was abolished in 1975, to the communist state that existed from 1987 to 1991. to the current political system. On the checkered floor is a jabanah, the traditional pot used to serve coffee. It's a symbol of conversation and dialogue in Ethiopia-the coffee ceremony brings people together to talk-and the flower represents love, friendship, and understanding.
